Course Description: This course will provide students with opportunities to develop their musical literacy through the creation, appreciation, analysis and performance of music, including traditional, commercial & art music. Students will apply the creative process when reflecting on, responding to and analysing performances. Students will consider the function of music in society and the impact of music on individuals and communities. In addition, the course will emphasize organizational and time management skills, as well as personal advocacy and respect.

Formative assessments will be ongoing throughout the academic year and students will receive feedback intended to help them improve their learning.

Students will be assessed continually on the following learning skills: Responsibility, Organization, Independent Work, Collaboration, Initiative and Self-Regulation.
